Exaggerated Square Footage

Although planning can be a daunting task, putting in the work upfront will ultimately leave you with a better finished project. Consider your lifestyle now and where it might be in the future. Will your family be growing or will they be leaving home to start families of their own? Even if your home is 2,500 to 3,000 sq. ft., if it is designed properly, this may be all the space you need. Lack of Storage Space

In addition to planning the overall space of your home, make sure you think about more than living areas, bedroom, and bathroom size. Whether you envision walk-in closets, a coat closet off the foyer, a large mudroom, or unfinished storage for those bins full of holiday decorations, consider what you don't have now but definitely want in your new space.

Poor Room Placement

The Size of the HVAC System

Poorly Lit

At Demlang, we see many new homeowners who want their new build to let in an abundance of natural light. Lots of windows allow that great natural light (in addition to great views to the outside). Make sure each room has the number of windows you want and that they are large enough to let that natural light shine through. This can become an issue in lower levels, but just because the space is underground doesn't mean your builder can't give you access to great natural light. Start by looking for a lot with partial or full exposure, allowing you to gain access to the outside light in the lower level of your house. Also ensure that each room has an appropriate amount of outlets to plug in lamps or any other electrical units.

Spending Money in the Wrong Places

Let's face the facts: most people have a limited budget when building. As you prioritize your budget, be sure to consider the important items like energy-efficient windows and a high-quality shingle on your roof first. Those aren't items you are likely to replace soon, and replacement won't be cheap or easy. While things like the perfect light fixture or kitchen faucet are important, they are much easier to upgrade down the road.
